Looking back there are few in Cruse now who can see the whole of our twentythree years. About seventy per cent of people now involved have come in during the last five years. Yet haw important it is to remember the past, using its lessons as a guide. If Cruse is a book, we are certainly several chapters on but there are times when we need to recap.

GROUP DISCUSSION

For instance, there is a lot of symbolism in the story of the cruse of oil from which our name comes. Maybe we should suggest that Committees and workers in Cruse, particularly new ones, read it and discuss its relevance for Cruse in the 1980's.

PLANS IN PIPELINE

What of the immediate future? In the pipeline is the application to the D.H.S.S. for our next triennial grant; a major conference on Bereavement Following Violence in 1983; a phased publicity campaign throughout 1982; our Silver Jubilee in 1984; and Council has agreed in principle to the appointment of a Training/Research Officer (now we have to find the money). We are looking thoroughly at the question of whether we should extend our service to all bereaved people and, if it is considered we should. what would be involved. International connections continue to develop as a result of my membership of the Executive of F.I.A.V., the International
