BOOK REVIEW

HELPING THE BEREAVED Alicia Skinner, Daniel S

Dworkin, New York: Basic Books, 1992. £18.95 hb

This most attractive, lucid book, by two clinical psychologists in American academia and private practice, provides a broad introduction to grief therapy with individuals and groups and to the need for self-examination and selfcare for therapists. Their framework is the American Diagnostic and Statistical Manual (DSM3R 1987) and much of the literature also is from across the Atlantic. The valuable chapter on cultural considerations in grief therapy mainly relates to minority groups within the US.

This valuable book puts the reader in touch with a wealth of clinical experience, the sections on loss and spiritual issues being particularly welcome. It should, however, be read alongside European literature on bereavement and trauma and on the interaction between bereavement and traumatic loss.

Any future edition would benefit from an enlarged section on children and adolescents and more on 'specific types of loss' such as homicide and through natural and man-made disaster and violence with discussion of the interaction between trauma and loss. The current edition deals with only AIDS, suicide and war.

ABSTRACTS

A Group Approach to Overcome Loss: A Model for a Bereavement Service in General Practice. Fenner P, Manchershaw A. Professional Nurse 1993; 8(10): 680-684.

The authors, a nurse practitioner and clinical psychologist in the UK, describe how they set up small, shortterm groups to bring together bereaved people who, because their grief was unresolved, seemed at risk of becoming increasingly depressed and isolated. Each group took part in six meetings, at which they talked about their experiences and emotions. The conclusion was that these meetings were sufficiently helpful to suggest that group bereavement counselling should be made available within the general health setting.

Latent Functions of Enfranchising the Disenfranchised Griever. Kamerman J. Death Studies 1993; 17(3): 281-287.

An increasing number of people, such as gay lovers, co-workers and friends, are debarred from grieving because their relationship to the dead person has no social legitimacy. The author suggests ways in which the legitimising of such relationships could not only allow such people to express their grief but might also improve their position in society. For example, he proposes putting pressure on employers to extend bereavement benefits such as counselling to grievers who at the moment are disenfranchised by employers' personnel policies.
